Sandra Beasley: Bringing the World to the Poem (see page 18 for biography)

Nano Nagle Place | Cost €180 | Limited to 15 participants

In this four-session workshop, we'll celebrate poems that map external landscapes: poems that survey the bright particulars of a world shaped by animals, food, travel, and science. If you've ever felt in a rut as a writer, this is the workshop for you. In each class, we'll begin with a guided close reading of texts to foster understanding of how a poem works. We'll integrate practical craft tips on how to expand imagery, break lines, and use sound to spark curiosity and provide closure. Every workshop will include a generative prompt, connected to the theme at hand, and in-class drafting. We'll have time to share this work, or other poems brought in by participants, for informal critique.

Manuscript Makeover with James Harpur

Two one-hour appointments available each day at The Munster Literature Centre | Cost €100



Is a poetry collection gathering dust in your top drawer? Are you unsure about your latest batch of poems – line endings, poem titles, clichés, clunky rhythms? Or perhaps you're seeking new directions, or advice about the poetry publishing world?

James will scrutinise your work, write comments on your manuscript, and present sympathetic, insightful and honest feedback to you face to face in a highly focused one-hour session. This is a rare opportunity to receive critical comments in person from an experienced practitioner of the poetic craft.

The cost per session/makeover is €100 for a maximum of 20 poems on a maximum of 20 pages (one-and-half line spacing, 12pt type), which includes time spent on them before the sessions. Advance booking is essential – only eight one-hour sessions are available, two per afternoon, 3–5pm, Wednesday to Saturday. Manuscripts must be sent to James at least two weeks in advance of the festival.

The Well Review was established in 2016 and is named after the historic Cork City neighbourhood of Sunday's Well.

The journal was created to provide a meeting ground for Irish and international poetry, and to also give space to include reflections on visual art and other disciplines. The third issue contains essays on music by James Harpur, Ishion Hutchinson and Brian Turner. This edition has been produced over the past year with a particular attention paid to the relationship between poetry and music.

Issue Three contains new poetry by Mona Arshi, Sasha Dugdale, Noelle Kocot, Jim Moore, Paul Muldoon, Billy Ramsell and many more. Issue Three also features an interview on poetry and music with the cellist, Sonia Wieder-Atherton. The winners of the inaugural Well Review Poetry Prize 2019 will also be published in this edition. It contains artwork by Dylan Brennan, Paul Joyce, Francisca Pageo and Romain Thiery.

The Well Review Issue Three launch takes place at the Cork School of Music, Union Quay, and will include readings by Sasha Dugdale, John Fitzgerald, James Harpur, Majella Kelly, Gerry Murphy and Billy Ramsell. There will also be a performance of Britten, Mahler and Stravinsky by the Cork-based cellist, Eimear Reidy.

Poetry

Sasha Dugdale's fourth collection *Joy* was a Poetry Book Society Choice in 2017 and its title poem won the Forward Prize for Best Single Poem in 2016. She is former editor of *Modern Poetry in Translation*.

James Harpur has had five poetry collections published by Anvil Press and is a past winner of the UK National Poetry Competition. His latest book, *The White Silhouette* (2018), is published by Carcanet.

Gerry Murphy was born in Cork in 1952. His poetry collections include *Muse* (2010), *My Flirtation with International Socialism* (2010) and *End of Part One: New and Selected Poems* (2006), all from Dedalus.

John Fitzgerald is a Kavanagh-prize winning poet. His poems have been published widely in journals, newspapers and anthologies. His debut chapbook *First Cut* was published by Southword Editions in 2017.

Majella Kelly was nominated by *Crannóg* for a Pushcart Prize and selected for the Poetry Ireland Introductions Series in 2017. She won 2nd prize in the 2018 Gregory O'Donoghue Poetry Competition.

Billy Ramsell was awarded the Ireland Chair of Poetry Bursary in 2013. He has published two collections with Dedalus Press, *Complicated Pleasures* in 2007 and *The Architect's Dream of Winter* in 2013.

Music

Eimear Reidy (MMUS Utrecht Conservatorium) has performed throughout Europe with Capella Cracoviensis, the Irish baroque orchestra, the RTÉ concert orchestra, Il Concerto Barocco and Amsterdam Symphony Orchestra in some of Europe's finest concert halls.



Louis Mulcahy & Thomas Dillon Redshaw



These four poets from China will read in Chinese. English translations will be provided in booklet form.


Shu Cai graduated with a BA in French literature from Beijing Foreign Languages University in 1987. He worked as a diplomat in the Chinese Embassy in Senegal from 1990 to 1994 and is currently a research fellow in the Chinese Academy of Social Sciences. He was awarded the Palmes académiques (Academic Palms) order of merit in France in 2008.



Xi Chuan is a poet, essayist, translator and a distinguished professor of Beijing Normal University. He has published nine collections of poetry, including *Notes on the Mosquito* (New Directions, 2012), and many other books of essays, critical writings and translations in over twenty countries.

Ran Ran is the author of five poetry collections including *The Space of a Gap, Zhuque Listens* and *To Whom to Talk*. She has won the Junma Award for Ethnic Literature, the Aiqing Award for Poetry and the Western China Literature Award. She is the vice president of Chongqing Municipal Writers Association.

Lu Wenli is a poet, writer and editor. She started publishing poetry in the 1980s and has written twelve books of poetry, essays and full-length novels including *The Unparalleled Scenery, Dance of the Hourglass* and *Grandma's Epic*. She is the vice president of Hangzhou Municipal Writers Association.
