Manuscript Makeover with James Harpur

Two one-hour appointments available each day 3 - 5 pm Wednesday 18th - Saturday 21st May Munster Literature Centre, 84 Douglas Street | Cost €100 | Limited to 8 individual appointments

Is a poetry collection gathering dust in your top drawer? Are you unsure about your latest batch of poems – line endings, poem titles, clichés, clunky rhythms? Or perhaps you're seeking new directions, or advice about the poetry publishing world?

James will scrutinise your work, write comments on your manuscript, and present sympathetic, insightful and honest feedback to you face to face in a highly focused onehour session. This is a rare opportunity to receive critical comments in person from an experienced practitioner of the poetic craft.

The cost per session/makeover is €100 for a maximum of 20 poems on a maximum of 20 pages (one-and-half line spacing, 12pt type), which includes time spent on them before the sessions. Advance booking is essential – only eight one-hour sessions are available, two per afternoon (3 - 4 pm and 4 - 5 pm Wednesday to Saturday). Manuscripts must be sent to James at least two weeks in advance of the festival.







He edited The Finest Music, an anthology of early Irish lyrics in translation, and A Quark for Mister Mark: 101 Poems about Science. He has received the Michael Hartnett Award, a Cholmondeley Award

and a PEN translation award. He is former Editor of *The Poetry Review* and Emeritus Professor of Poetry at Sheffield Hallam University. Born in Lisgoold, Co. Cork, he lives in London and teaches at the Faber Academy.




Maurice Riordan Shoulder Tap



The duo's translation of Gerry Murphy's poems, Plus loin encore, will appear with Circe next August. Clíona sat on the judging panel of this year's Dublin Literary Award.




Rachael Hegarty is a Dubliner. Her poetry is widely published and broadcast. Her debut, *Flight Paths Over Finglas* won the Shine Strong Award in 2018. A child survivor of the Dublin and Monaghan bombings, her *May Day 1974* collection has received national and international acclaim.

Paula Meehan hailed Rachael's *Dancing with Memory* as a biography of a mother charted through generations of dance, deft sonnets and noble villanelles. Rachael's

next collection, *Wild Flowers Made Me* is due out in spring 2023. Rachael's kids say she uses the 3 F-words too much: Finglas, feminism and feckin' poetry.

To mark the poet Gerry Murphy's seventieth year, this special event features friends of the poet reading their favourite poems of his, reaching from the present back to the early 80s.



Gerry Murphy is an Irish poet, born in Cork in 1952. His latest collection is The Humours of Nothingness (2020). He has published two chapbooks with Southword Editions, M_y Life as a Stalinist and Kissing Maura O'Keeffee, as well as Pocket Apocalypse, his translations of the Polish poet Katarzyna Borun-Jagodzinska. Murphy's own poems form the basis for a live poetryand-music show by Crazy

Dog Audio Theatre, entitled *The People's Republic of Gerry Murphy*, which ran at the Cork Guinness Jazz Festival in 2010 to considerable critical success. He is a member of Aosdána.

Dean Browne won the Geoffrey Dearmer Prize in 2021 and his pamphlet, *Kitchens at Night*, was a winner of the Poetry Business International Pamphlet Competition; it was published by Smith|Doorstop in 2022. His poems have appeared widely in journals such as *Banshee, Poetry* (Chicago), *Poetry Ireland Review, Poetry Review, PN Review, Southword, The Stinging Fly*, and elsewhere.

Jack Healy is a Cork city based actor and playwright. He has written scripts for The Everyman Palace Cork, RTÉ Radio, and Macra Na Feirme. He has also written extensively for children. His play, *The Man in the Moon* (with Enda Walsh and based on a story of Jack's) was premiered at the Deptford Studios London in 2009.

Katherine O'Donnell is Associate Professor, History of Ideas UCD School of Philosophy, University College Dublin. She has published widely in Irish cultural history and is a member of Justice for Magdalenes Research.

Liz O'Donoghue: born North Cork 1960. She's a mother, teacher, writer and film maker. Greatest achievement: her son. Best reading: Shanghai International Literary Festival 2010 on St Patrick's Day. Favourite achievement: screening of *Murphy's Wall* in the 2011 Cork Film Festival. Presently: working on her second memoir.




Gillian Allnutt has







John F. Deane was born on Achill Island off the west coast of Ireland. He is founder of Poetry Ireland, Ireland's national poetry society, and its journal Poetry Ireland Review. A new collection Dear Pilgrims appeared from Carcanet in 2018 and a collection of poems set on Achill Island with paintings by John Behan, Achill: The Island published by Currach Press also appeared in 2018. In 2016 Deane was the Teilhard de Chardin Fellow in Catholic Studies in Loyola University, Chicago and taught a course in poetry. In 2019 he was visiting poet in Notre Dame University in Indiana. In 2021 Carcanet published his new collection of poems, Naming of the Bones.

James Harpur has published eight collections of poetry and is a member of Aosdána. His two latest poetry books are *The Examined Life*, an odyssey through boarding school; and *The Oratory of Light*, poems inspired by St Columcille, or Columba, and the island of Iona. He has won a number of awards for his work, including the Michael Hartnett Poetry Prize and the UK National Poetry Competition. His debut novel, *The Pathless Country*, a spiritual quest set in 1900s Ireland and London, was published in 2021. He lives in West Cork. He teaches creative writing, edits the *Unfinished Book of Poetry* and promotes poetry in his role as director of Ó Bhéal, Cork.

Patrick Cotter is an Irish poet, born in Cork City where he still lives. His poems have been published in journals such as the *Financial Times, The London Review of Books, Poetry* and *Poetry Review*. He is a recipient of the Keats-Shelley Prize for Poetry. His poems have been translated into over a dozen languages and he has given readings of his work across the Northern Hemisphere. *Sonic White Poise* is his third full-length collection.

Matthew Geden was born and brought up in the English Midlands, moving to Kinsale in 1990. He is the Writer in Residence for Cork County Library and Arts Service, teaches on the MA Creative Writing course at UCC and runs Kinsale Writing School. His publications include *The Place Inside* (Dedalus Press) and *Fruit* (SurVision Books). A new collection is due out in the autumn.

Afric McGlinchey is a multi-award-winning poet from West Cork, Ireland. Her collections are *The lucky star of hidden things* and *Ghost of the Fisher Cat* (Salmon Poetry), both with Italian translations published by L'Arcolaio. A surrealist pamphlet, *Invisible Insane* (SurVision) appeared in 2019. Her most recent publication is *Tied to the Wind*, a hybrid childhood memoir, published by Broken Sleep Books.

Kate Moore is a writer & playwright from Kerry now based in Cork City, and works for the Munster Literature Centre as Operations Officer. She has previously been produced in the Everyman, Cork Arts Theatre, Siamsa Tire Theatre and by UCC Dramat. She has been published by the *Irish Times* and Wild Words Book Festival, and is currently under mentorship from Children's Books Ireland. Clíona Ní Ríordáin is a critic, translator and Professor of English at the Sorbonne Nouvelle. Her monograph, *English Language Poets in University College Cork 1970-1980* (Palgrave Macmillan) was published in 2020. Her translation of Maylis Besserie's novel, *Yell, Sam, If You Still Can* appears from Lilliput Press in June. She has edited three anthologies of Irish poetry, including *Jeune Poésie d'Irlande: les poètes du Munster* (2015), co-edited and co-translated with Paul Bensimon. The duo's translation of Gerry Murphy's poems, *Plus loin encore*, will appear with Circe next August. Clíona sat on the judging panel of this year's Dublin Literary Award.

Pádraig Ó Tuama is a poet and theologian from Ireland. Author of books of poetry, prose and theology, he is also the presenter of the podcast Poetry Unbound from On Being Studios. *Poetry Unbound* – a book from the podcast – is forthcoming from Canongate in October 2022. *Feed the Beast*, a pamphlet of new poetry, is forthcoming from Broken Sleep Books at the end of 2022. He's a regular broadcaster on national radio stations, and most recently presented a programme on the faith life of John Donne, for BBC Radio 4, and has interviewed poets Lorna Goodison, Gail McConnell, Hanif Abdurraqib and many more.

Hilary Wakeman's husband John Wakeman founded *THE SHOp a magazine* of poetry in 1999. In 2001, when she retired as Rector of the most southwesterly parish in the Church of Ireland, she became its co-editor and art editor. *THE SHOp* closed in 2014. Hilary now lives in Norwich, from where she co-edited with Hilary Elfick, *THE SHOp an anthology*, published by the Liffey Press in 2020.
